

SERVING CHILDREN AND ADUL

Children and adults with disabilities and their families need faith communities to provide the accommodations necessary to have full and meaningful participation in the Mass and in the life of the Church.

Some parishes may be unable to provide every accommodation, but many adaptations have little or no cost. Some funds/resources are available, and solutions are found when people are **intentional about seeking other options.**

Families appreciate when people ask them what they need.

Sacramental adaptive resources are available and additional modifications and/or approaches can be created. Families can communicate what will work best for their loved one during the preparation and celebration of a



WHAT ARE THE **REQUIREMENTS FOR A CHILD OR ADULT** WITH A DISABILITY **TO RECEIVE** A SACRAMENT?

In 2017, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) released the Revised Edition for the "Guidelines for the Celebration of Sacraments for Persons with Disabilities"

"To the degree possible, those with disabilities should be included along with others during the preparation and celebration of the sacrament. At times, pastoral need may necessitate an accommodated setting and a simpler manner."

BAPTISM

"Baptism is to be made available to all who freely ask for it, [and] are properly disposed... Disability, of itself, is never a reason for deferring Baptism. Persons who lack the use of reason are to be baptized provided at least one parent or guardian consents to it."

CONFIRMATION

"All baptized Catholics ...who because of intellectual or developmental disabilities may never attain the use of reason can receive the Sacrament of Confirmation and should be encouraged either directly or, if necessary, through their parents, to receive it."

EUCHARIST

"A person needs only to

'distinguish the body of Christ from ordinary food' even if this recognition is evidenced through manner, gesture, or reverential silence rather than verbally... Cases favor of the right of the Catholic to receive the sacrament."

RECONCILIATION

"As long as the individual is capable of having a sense of contrition for having committed sin, even if he or she cannot describe the sin precisely in words, the person may receive sacramental absolution."
